NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

Ready for Any Situation

September is *National Preparedness Month*, a nationwide effort to encourage families and communities to prepare for emergencies. This month, take the time to ensure you are ready for unexpected events, whether it's a natural disaster, like a hurricane or tsunami, or man-made emergencies.

Start by making a comprehensive emergency plan that includes how you will communicate with family members if you are not together when an emergency occurs. Practice your plan with all family members to ensure everyone knows what to do and where to go.

Also, if you don't already have one, you should consider making an emergency kit! Preparing now helps minimize risks and ensures your family's safety during any season.

Emergency Kit Essentials

- Water: 1 gallon per person per day for 7 days
- Non-perishable food: enough for 7 days
- Medications and first aid
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Important documents: IDs, insurance, medical records (in waterproof containers)
- Cash in small denominations and a battery-powered radio
- Supplies for pets, infants, or elderly family members
- Personal hygiene items and sanitation supplies
- Additional fuel for vehicles and propane for cooking
- Local maps and evacuation routes

**Emergency repair supplies: tarps, duct tape, tools, and spare lumber If you see a motorist violating one or more traffic laws, we encourage you to report it to HPD at the non-emergency number (808)935-3311 or for emergencies 911.

Provide us with:

- vehicle's license number
- make and color
- date, time, location + a description of the violation

The Traffic Services Section can also be reached at (808)961-2226. A letter will be sent to the vehicle's registered owner and convey what was observed.

Police will *not* reveal the identity of the person who made the complaint.

AUGUST REPORTED CRIMES



- **Assault:** When a person intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes bodily injury to another or negligently with a dangerous instrument.
- **Burglary:** Intentionally & unlawfully entering & remaining in a building with intent to commit a crime against person or property.
- **CPD:** Criminal Property Damage; unlawful damaging of another's property; vandalism.
- **Robbery:** If in the course of committing theft or non-consensual taking of a motor vehicle the person uses force.
- **Theft:** When a person obtains or exerts control over property of another with intent to deprive the other person of their property.
- **UCPV:** Unauthorized Control of Propelled vehicle; auto theft.
- **UEMV**: Unauthorized entry into a motor vehicle; car break-in.
