ANNOUNCEMENT

Isaac Hale Beach Park will be closed starting
September 2 until further notice to support
crane dredging operations at the Pohoiki Boat
Ramp. The \$9,28 million project, awarded to
Goodfellow Bros., LLC by DLNR, will remove
sand and lava debris deposited during the 2018
Kilauea eruption and restore the boat ramp's
entrance channel. Work is expected to be
completed by November. This temporary closure
is necessary for public safety. Once finished, the
project will reopen safe ocean access for fishers,
boaters, and emergency responders.

- Assault: When a person intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes bodily injury to another or negligently with a dangerous instrument.
- Burglary: Intentionally & unlawfully entering & remaining in a building with intent to commit a crime against person or property.
- CPD: Criminal Property Damage; unlawful damaging of another's property; vandalism.
- **Traffic Casualty:** Major traffic casualties; \$3000 plus in damages and/or injuries.

- Robbery: If in the course of committing theft or non-consensual taking of a motor vehicle the person uses force.
- **Theft**: When a person obtains or exerts control over property of another with intent to deprive the other person of their property.
- UCPV: Unauthorized Control of Propelled vehicle; auto theft.
- **UEMV**: Unauthorized entry into a motor vehicle; car break-in.



SUICIDE PREVETION AWARENESS MONTH

Staying Alert, Saving Lives

September is National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month – a time to promote open conversation, shine a light on warning signs, and connect residents to help that matters. NAMI (National Alliance of Mental Illness) reminds us that a single honest conversation can save a life.

The Power of One Call: 988

When it comes to a mental health crisis, immediate and judgement-free support is just one call, text, or chat away. Dial 988 to connect with trained counselors available 24/7.

A Recognizing the Warning Signs

Being able to identify when someone may be struggling is one of the most effective tools for prevention. Common warning signs include:

- Talking about wanting to die or constant feelings of hopelessness.
- Withdrawing from family, friends, or usual activities.
- Extreme mood swings, increased anger, or irritability.
- Changes in sleep sleeping too much or too little.
- Increased use of alcohol or drugs.
- Giving away possessions or saying goodbye.

KŪPUNA SCAM ALERT

Stay Alert. Trust Your Instincts.

As scammers use artificial intelligence (AI) to create more sophisticated scams, protecting Hawai'i's kūpuna (elders) has become a priority. The most effective defense combines education, caution, and leveraging technology to your advantage. AI is used by fraudsters for deepfake audio, realistic-looking phishing emails, and complex investment scams, making it harder to spot a hoax.

What to Look For

- Al Voice Cloning: Scammers use Al to clone the voices of family members, creating convincing audio messages that claim an emergency and demand money. These calls prey on emotional bonds and the urgency to help a loved one.
- Deepfake Videos: Though less common, deepfake videos created with AI can mimic a person's appearance and speech, adding another layer of deception to scams.
- Al-powered Phishing: Al allows scammers to generate highly personalized and realistic phishing emails or texts that impersonate banks, government agencies, or tech companies. These messages often prompt you to click on malicious links or provide sensitive information.
- Al-generated Investment Scams: Scammers create fake websites and online personas to promote fraudulent investment opportunities with guaranteed high returns.
- Fake Tech Support: Scammers
 impersonate tech support agents, using
 fake pop-ups or calls to claim a computer
 has a virus. They then gain remote access
 to the device or charge for unnecessary
 services.




📝 Tips to Stay Safe

- Verify emergencies: If a call is received about a family member in trouble, hang up immediately. Call the family member or another relative directly to verify the situation.
- Establish a family code word: Create a private word or phrase that only your family knows to confirm a real emergency.
- Do not respond to unknown texts OR click unknown links:
 Responding to an unknown text, even to say "STOP," can confirm your number is active and mark you for more spam.
- Block spam calls: Use callscreening and spam-blocking features on your phone to filter out suspicious numbers.
- Take your time: Do not allow yourself to be rushed or pressured into making a financial decision.
 Real emergencies and legitimate offers do not require you to act immediately.
- Consult a trusted person: If an offer seems "too good to be true" or you feel uneasy, talk to a family member, professional, or the Senior Medicare Patrol.

SEPTEMBER = EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS MONTH

A few weeks ago, our community was reminded how quickly emergencies can unfold. The tsunami warning showed the importance of being prepared before the sirens sound or alerts come through.

What we learned

- **Know Your Zone:** Check Hawai'i County's tsunami evacuation maps so you and your 'ohana know where to go.
- Act Quickly, Stay Calm: Practice safe routes and meeting points so everyone moves with confidence.
- Have Supplies Ready: A "go kit" or "72 hour kit" with water, food, medications, flashlights, and documents should be packed ahead of time.
- Stay Informed: Sign up for Civil Defense alerts and follow official county updates not only Facebook lives.

HAZARD IMPACT MAP





REPORT AN UNSAFE DRIVER

Notify authorities about reckless, impaired, or dangerous driving behavior.



GET A COPY OF A POLICE REPORT

Request copies of police reports for legal, personal, or insurance purposes.



SUBMIT A TIP ABOUT AN UNSOLVED CASE

Provide confidential information to assist investigations.
