

- **Assault:** When a person intentionally, knowingly, or recklessly causes bodily injury to another or negligently with a dangerous instrument.
- **Burglary:** Intentionally & unlawfully entering & remaining in a building with intent to commit a crime against person or property.
- **CPD:** Criminal Property Damage; unlawful damaging of another's property; vandalism.
- **Traffic Casualty:** Major traffic casualties; \$3000 plus in damages and/or injuries.

- **Robbery:** If in the course of committing theft or non-consensual taking of a motor vehicle the person uses force.
- **Theft:** When a person obtains or exerts control over property of another with intent to deprive the other person of their property.
- **UCPV:** Unauthorized Control of Propelled vehicle; auto theft.
- **UEMV:** Unauthorized entry into a motor vehicle; car break-in.

If You Suspect a Break-In

If you return home and believe someone has entered your home—or may still be inside—do not enter. Leave the area immediately and call police.

- Go to a safe location nearby (a neighbor's home or your vehicle).
- Call police and provide your address and what you observed.
- Do not touch anything or confront anyone.
- Wait for officers to arrive before re-entering your home.



NEIGHBORHOOD NUGGETS

Recent burglary activity across Hawai'i Island serves as a reminder that prevention starts at home. Small, consistent steps can significantly reduce opportunity and help keep our communities safe.

Home Safety Tip

Lock doors and windows every time you leave—even for short errands. Avoid hiding spare keys outside, as these are commonly discovered during break-ins. Keep exterior lighting on at night and ensure entry points are visible from the street.

Vehicle Safety Tip

Always lock vehicles and remove valuables, even when parked at home. Do not leave keys, wallets, tools, or electronics inside. Thieves frequently check unlocked vehicles in residential areas and driveways.

Neighborhood Safety Tip

Get to know your neighbors and their vehicles. Establish simple communication—a text thread or group chat—to quickly share concerns or suspicious activity.

WHEN CALLING 911

WHAT IS 911

911 is a free emergency phone number used to request immediate assistance from emergency services. This includes Police, Fire, and medical services.

FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY!

An emergency is any situation that requires immediate assistance from law enforcement, firefighters, or an ambulance. If you are ever in doubt about whether a situation is an emergency, you should call 911. It is better to be safe and let the 911 dispatcher determine if you require emergency assistance. Otherwise, you can reach the police on our non-emergency line at (808) 935-3311 to make reports, seek advice, or request other police services.

What to expect

Calling 911 is a highly stressful experience that many find overwhelming. You may be dealing with trauma, extreme emotions, loud noises, or even a dangerous situation and our dispatchers know this. They will strive to keep you focused and organized to move things along. This way, they can get the proper emergency service to you as fast as possible, but they need your help.

You will need to know where you are calling from. This is one of the first things you will be asked. Take a moment to figure this out before placing the call. While on the line with the call taker, they will guide the conversation, wait for them to ask questions, and answer them clearly and calmly. The call taker is trained to ask the right questions in the proper order so they can get emergency services to you right away. Stay calm, and remain on the line until emergency services arrive, do not hang up. The call taker will guide you through the emergency until then.


If you follow these tips, you will get a faster response time which can be the difference between life and death.

What if I accidentally call 911

If you happen to call by accident, stay on the line until you can tell the call taker that you called by accident and there is no emergency. This saves the call taker from having to call you back and confirm there is no emergency or possibly diverting police to check your address for an emergency.



SLOW DOWN & MOVE OVER




Attention Hawaii drivers! Did you know that there's a law in place, Hawaii Revised Statutes 291C-27, to help protect our emergency responders? It's called the **move over law**, & it's important to understand what it requires of you.

When you see a stationary emergency vehicle with its lights on, such as a police vehicle, ambulance or fire truck you must take action. Here's what you need to do:

First, change to an adjacent lane if possible. If you can't do that, move two lanes over to create an empty lane between you & the emergency vehicle.


Second, slow down to a safe speed based on the current road conditions. Be prepared to come to a full stop if necessary to make a safe lane change.



This law applies to a variety of emergency vehicles, including police & fire department vehicles, tow trucks, & more. If you don't comply with the move over law, you could face a traffic citation, mandatory court appearance, & a fine of up to \$1,000.

Remember, violating the move over law & causing injury or death to an emergency responder may result in an arrest and additional charges. Let's all do our part to keep our emergency responders safe by following Hawaii's move over law.



Improving Communication, Access, and Public Safety



VERSATERM COMMUNITYCONNECT

The Hawai'i Police Department is expanding community engagement and transparency through **Versaterm CommunityConnect**, an automated system that provides timely updates about police calls and cases via text message or email.

• What to expect:

- *Text confirmation* for certain service calls made from a cell phone, acknowledging your request for service
- Updates if an officer is delayed, helping reduce uncertainty and follow-up calls
- *Case status* and *arrest notifications* when key updates occur
- *Victim portal access* to view case information and enroll in notifications at engage.hawaiipolice.gov
- Messages available in English, Spanish, and Tagalog to better serve our diverse community

VICTIM INFO PORTAL

Check the status of your police report and receive real-time updates through HPD portal.



POLICE DIRECTORY

Access contact information for HPD departments, stations, and specialized units.



CRIME STOPPERS

Submit anonymous tips about crimes or suspicious activity to help keep our community safe.



ANIMAL CONTROL

Report stray or dangerous animals, access lost-and-found services, or learn about licensing and care.



DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Find support, counseling, and emergency resources for victims of domestic violence.



KULEANA HOTLINE

Share non-emergency community concerns confidentially to improve neighborhood safety.



REPORT AN UNSAFE DRIVER

Notify authorities about reckless, impaired, or dangerous driving behavior.



GET A COPY OF A POLICE REPORT

Request copies of police reports for legal, personal, or insurance purposes.



SUBMIT A TIP ABOUT AN UNSOLVED CASE

Provide confidential information to assist investigations.
